First Reading

2 Kgs 4:42-44

A man came from Baal-shalishah, bringing Elisha, the man of God, bread from the first-fruits, twenty barley loaves and fresh grain in the ear. 'Give it to the people to eat,' Elisha said. But his servant replied, 'How can I serve this to a hundred men?' 'Give it to the people to eat' he insisted 'for the Lord says this, "They will eat and have some left over."' He served them; they ate and had some over, as the Lord had said.

Second Reading

Eph 4:1-6

I, the prisoner in the Lord, implore you to lead a life worthy of your vocation. Bear with one another charitably, in complete selflessness, gentleness and patience. Do all you can to preserve the unity of the Spirit by the peace that binds you together. There is one Body, one Spirit, just as you were all called into one and the same hope when you were called. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God who is Father of all, through all and within all.

Gospel

Jn 6:1-15

Jesus went off to the other side of the Sea of Galilee – or of Tiberias – and a large crowd followed him, impressed by the signs he gave by curing the sick. Jesus climbed the hillside, and sat down there with his disciples. It was shortly before the Jewish feast of Passover.

Looking up, Jesus saw the crowds approaching and said to Philip, 'Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?' He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, 'There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down.

Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, 'Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted.' So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal of five barley loaves. The people, seeing this sign that he had given, said, 'This really is the prophet who is to come into the world.' Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself.

Generosity and Trust, Key to the Miracle of Satisfaction



When I arrived in Berala, I could see that the Church and premises needed some maintenance. Therefore I asked the then Finance Committee to make a list of the maintenance work to be attended. They came up with a list which did not include what I thought were major and urgent repairs like leaking roof of the Church and eroded window frames. So I asked them what about the roof and the windows of the church. “We cannot afford them Father,” they said, “so why bother to include them in the list”. Like good financial stewards, they were making a business case. There was not enough money in the parish fund to attend to these major works. Therefore they had a point. But I told them that we do not go by business like planning. We look at what is needed. If it is God’s Church, God will provide. We identified the important works to be done, and started to act on them. Then, so many generous people started to pour in their time, their talents, and their resources to assist the parish. Consequently now have a well set up and maintained church and premises. And our finances are very healthy, even better than before starting the renovation works. That is the miracle. When we are open to the generosity of the people and trust in the providence of God, miracles happen.

We see a similar miracle in John 6:1-15. The Gospel speaks about the multiplication of the loaves by Jesus on the shores of Tiberias. Jesus saw the hungry crowd in the lonely place and said to Philip, “Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?” Philip’s answer would fit in with the concept of a good business man. He assessed the financial situation and said, “Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.” So it is an untenable situation, according to Philip. Andrew, another disciple, also shared the attitude of Philip. He said, “There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?” Jesus taught them to welcome the generosity of the little boy with five barley loaves and two fish and put their trust in the providence of Our Father in Heaven. Even after feeding the five thousand men and their women and children, there were enough left over food for all twelve tribes of Israel, twelve baskets full of scraps.

As an introduction to this narrative, John writes, ‘It was shortly before the Jewish feast of Passover.’ In telling so, John indicates that what we see in this miracle is what to expect in the Last Supper of Jesus Christ. For us it is about what to expect in the Eucharist which is the re-doing of the Last Supper of the Lord. Be generous with what you have and trust in the providence of God. Then you see miracles happening, in your life as well as in the world around you. Also be open to the generosity of your brothers and sisters and lead them to trust in the providence of God the Father. This, not the our skilful business plan, is the satisfying solution to the real hunger of the people around us.

REFLECTIONS ON JOHN 6:1-15

Different View. A miracle of sharing.

Some scripture scholars suggest that the real miracle of the feeding of the multitude was not so much a multiplication of meagre resources by Jesus but rather a personal response by individuals within the crowd. It is suggested that upon seeing the willingness of Jesus (and the small boy whose food it was) to share the small amount of food available, everyone dug into their pockets and pulled out the small amount of food they also had and shared it with one another. The miracle was a breaking through from selfishness and isolation to a spirit of sharing and community.

Living the Gospel. Plenty for all.

The feeding of the multitude is a profoundly political statement. Quite simply, there is sufficient food in our world to ensure that no one should ever be hungry. Sadly, the distribution of that food is such that there are some in our world whose bellies are expanding from an excess of food while others are distended from the lack of it. We can easily feed the entire world. It is the responsibility of those of us in the developed world with more than we need to bring about a more equitable distributions with those who don’t even have enough to live.

Gospel Focus. Messiah.

.At the time of Jesus there was a heightened expectation that the Messiah—the anointed one of God—would come and once again set the people of Israel free. However, there was great conjecture about what sort of person the Messiah would be. Some thought he would be a warrior king; others a wise priestly leader; others thought a shepherd-king in the image of David. Confounding all these expectations, Jesus’ model of Messianic leadership was that of the servant leader; a leader who was one with the people, offering hope and meaning in the midst of their everyday suffering and struggling.

I rejoice exceedingly in all my tribulations

From a homily by Saint John Chrysostom on the second letter of St Paul to the Corinthians 7:2-16.

From a homily by Saint John Chrysostom on the second letter of St Paul to the Corinthians 7:2-16. Again Paul turns to speak of love, softening the harshness of his rebuke. For after convicting and reproaching them for not loving him as he had loved them, breaking away from his love and attaching themselves to troublemakers, he again takes the edge off the reproach by saying: Open your hearts to us, that is, love us. He asks for a favor which will be no burden to them but will be more profitable to the giver than to the receiver. And he did not use the word "love" but said, more appealingly: Open your hearts to us.

Who, he said, has cast us out of your minds, thrust us from your hearts? How is it that you feel constraint with us? For, since he has said earlier: You are restricted in your own affection, he now declares himself more openly and says: Open your heart to us, thus once more drawing them to him. For nothing so much wins love as the knowledge that one's lover desires most of all to be himself loved.

For I said before, he tells them, that you are in our hearts to die together or live together. This is love at its height, that even though in disfavor, he wishes both to die and to live with them. For you are in our hearts, not just somehow or other, but in the way I have said. It is possible to love and yet to draw back when danger threatens; but my love is not like that.

I am filled with consolation. What consolation? That which comes from you because you, being changed for the better, have consoled me by what you have done. It is natural for a lover both to complain that he is not loved in return and to fear that he may cause distress by complaining too much. Therefore, he says: I am filled with consolation, I rejoice exceedingly.

It is as if he said, I was much grieved on your account, but you have made it up for me in full measure and given me comfort; for you have not only removed the cause for any grief but filled me with a richer joy.

Then he shows the greatness of that joy by saying not only I rejoice exceedingly but also the words which follow: in all my tribulations. So great, he says, was the delight that you gave me that it was not even dimmed by so much tribulation, but overcame by its strength and keenness all those sorrows which had invaded my heart, and took away from me all awareness of them.

FEASTS & MEMORIALS OF THE WEEK

Tuesday, 25 July - St Ignatius of Loyola




Born at Loyola (Spain) in 1491. Died on this day at Rome in 1556. A Spanish nobleman trained in diplomacy and the use of arms, wounded in battle against the French. The experience of conversion while convalescing led him to write the Spiritual Exercises. Then founded the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) and became its first superior general. Remembered for his loyalty to the Church and its renewal, his ministry to the marginal, his concern for education, and his dedication "to the greater glory of God," the motto of the Jesuits.

Wednesday, 1 August - St Alphonsus Liguori



Born at Naples (Italy) in 1696. Died at Nocera on this day in 1787. A lawyer before ordination. After founding the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer (Redemptorists), he was for thirteen years bishop of Sant' Agata dei Goti, but resigned due to ill health. He coped with much internal conflict within the congregation and external opposition. Remembered as a popular preacher and devotional writer and as an influential master of moral theology.

Friday, 3 August - St Dominic



Born at Calaruega (Spain) about 1170. Died at Bologna (Italy) on 6 August 1221. An Augustinian canon noted for prayer, penance, and an exemplary life. In a time of violent crusades he sought the reconciliation of Albigensian heretics through instruction and prayer. Established the Order of Preachers (Dominicans) to revitalise the Church through study, teaching, preaching, and prayer. Remembered as a preacher, organiser, and patron of learning.

Saturday, 4 August - St John Vianney



Born near Lyons (France) in 1786. Died at Ars on this day in 1859. Overcame various obstacles, including little education and lack of means, to be ordained a priest. Served in a remote parish as the Curé of Ars, where his sanctity attracted thousands of visitors. Remembered for his preaching and confessional counsel and is honoured as a model for parish clergy.
