Kosher food is not enough

Five years ago I spent a month in Israel as part of my Sabbatical leave. A Jewish hotel I stayed at during this time had a good restaurant. It was on the first floor. But the café was on the third floor. It was deliberate. The Jewish custom of Kosher food does not allow them to mix dairy products with meat products. They took their customs very seriously. The hotel did not want anyone, even accidentally, to use the same knife to cut meat and cheese. Therefore they made sure the cutlery from the café did not mix with the cutlery of the restaurant. Such a strict tradition of eating habits was developed over the years. It had some basis in the books of Torah. Therefore they were following it strictly. So much so, their identity depended on the observance of Kosher customs and Sabbath practices. Even today that seems to be the case.

Jesus challenged the religiosity of the Jewish people based on their customs and practices. "Nothing that goes into a man from outside can make him unclean; it is the things that come out of a man that make him unclean". (Mark 7:15) It is not so much our traditions and practices that make us religious people. We should be able to enter into the spirit of the law God has given us and live accordingly to become religious people. In a multicultural society like ours, clinging to our cultural practices would help us to be in touch with our cultural roots, and provide us a sense of cultural identity. But to be a true religious person we need to go beyond it. We should be able to have a fellowship which transcends the cultural boundaries to become a true Christian community. The spirit of God's law demands we engage in works of charity and compassion. It demands us to work for the welfare of others especially the less advantaged. So participation in the compassion and mercy ministries of the parish should not be just for those who have extra time on their hands, but for all worshipping Christians. Otherwise what Jesus quoted from Isaiah will sadly be true of us too. Jesus quoted the prophet and said, "This people honours me only with lip-service, while their hearts are far from me. The worship they offer me is worthless, the doctrine they teach are only human regulations." (Mark 7:6-7)

In our sacramental life we can also fall into the fallacy of not entering into the proper meaning of what we do. There is a tendency among many people to take their children to the church for baptism, first communion, and confirmation; but not to care about any more involvement with the worshipping community. What they do not realise is that these rituals are meant to initiate them into the church so that these children can celebrate their spiritual life through their weekly participation in the Eucharist. If the Jews used their traditions to validate their actions, now people use popular appeal to justify their ill-formed religious practices.

Do not put aside the commandment of God to cling to human regulations.

Like other sacramental preparations the primary obligation to prepare the children for the Sacrament rests with the parents. The parish office and the schools can only assist the parents in their effort to prepare the children.

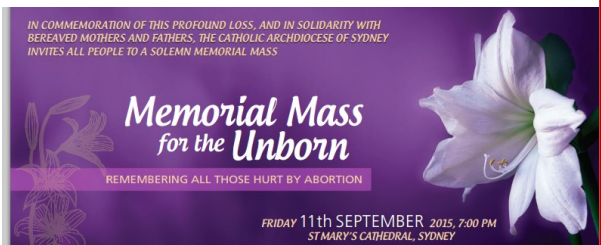

Feasts of the Week.

3 September - St Gregory the Great: Born in Rome about 540. At age 34 he was appointed chief magistrate of Rome. He built 6 monasteries in Sicily and a 7th in his own home of Rome. He became a priest at 35. He was unanimously elected Pope in 590 and is known above all for his contributions to the Liturgy of the Mass and Office. He is one of the four great Doctors of the Latin Church and is considered to be patron saint of teachers. Gregory died on March 12 in the year 604.

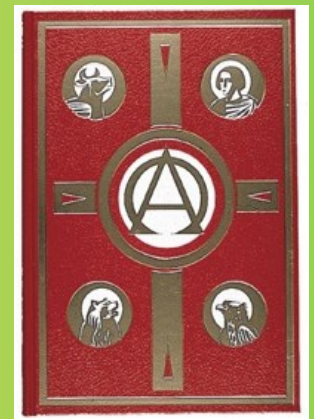
